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












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

Executive Director's Note...

Dear Esteemed Readers,

I would like to start this entry with a conversation I had with Mr. Gracium Chithonje, YONECO's Finance Officer, over work performance issues. In his reflections, he said it would be necessary for employees to contemplate whether they would hire someone with their attitude, work approach, and performance and alike if they were an employer. In other words, would we employ ourselves in our current state? He sounded very philosophical maybe because he is a pastor. I found his line of thinking very interesting and inspiring.

We seriously need to reflect on whether we are in government offices, working in NGOs or managing our businesses. "In our current state as an employee of the organizations or company we are working for; would we employ ourselves in the organization or company? Would the organization or company move forward? What would it take to move?" Would this be the reason why our business fails to thrive? We have restaurants that open at 08:00am and close at 04:45pm and expect to make the same amount of money as someone who opened at 05:00am and closed at 09:00pm.

Our approach to work, business and life in general leaves a lot to be desired. The majority of us develop plans for our bosses and supervisors and have no clue how useful this is in our lives. We seriously have to reflect on these matters. It is so unfortunate that for every wrong, we point fingers at the government, leaders or the president. Others will say it is about leadership. But do we also perceive ourselves as part of those leaders?

Over the last few weeks, we have been talking to young people about their visions and missions. The results have been devastating. A simple question of "What do you want to achieve when you reach 50 years?" has sent the majority of our young people packing with no clear direction. We are wondering whether this is a reflection of the current standards of our education or not. Mind you, there are young people with diplomas or degrees and they have no clue in terms of what they want to become. We are asking ourselves whether career counselling is still operational or not. This poses a great threat to our young people because if they have no direction, then the country has no direction at all. Personal leadership

development is fundamental and starts with "defining a personal vision and mission." If one cannot define a personal direction, it means every direction is possible. Defining a personal vision means that you will channel all your energies to this vision and mission. In line with the Malawi Vision 2063, every individual has a contribution to make. Take time to reflect on your vision and mission and set targets for yourself.

As we move ahead, it is worth highlighting that Malawi has experienced El Nino which has seen the southern region and other parts of the central region being hit by drought. As we reflect on our operations, let us spend time on how we are going to support the affected areas and people. What plans do we have and how are we going to address the situations in the communities?

Allow me to conclude this entry by reminding everyone that March 3, 2024, is a day when we remember those who died for the liberation of Malawi. However, as we remember these heroes, we should also reflect on the recent developments in the political environments where we are seeing very retrogressive events of political party clashes. We are over 18 months to the Tripartite Elections day and it is so unfortunate that we have now begun witnessing political violence. We urge political party leaders and their supporters to refrain from inciting violence. Our goal should be to make Malawi a great nation and a real democratic state. Young people, do not be used in these appalling acts.

YONECO Drills 59 Young People with Life Skills in Rumphi

In February 2024, YONECO conducted a series of life skills sessions at Rumphi Youth Drop-In-Centre targeting young people between 10 and 18 years of age from the vicinity of the centre.

The sessions were aimed at equipping the young participants with the necessary life skills to enable them to resist peer pressure which is among the leading factors that drive many young people into drug and substance abuse.

Consequently, many young people in the areas have been struggling with mental health problems. In addition, authorities in the districts also bemoaned the high prevalence of juvenile delinquency.

Thus, this compelled YONECO to intervene by engaging the young people themselves to understand the dangers of drugs and substance abuse and ably make informed choices.

In total, 59 young people comprising 25 girls and 34 boys attended the education sessions that were conducted for three weeks.

On 14 February 2024, YONECO through its district office in Mangochi organized a drug and substance abuse awareness session targeting young people from the township.

The session helped young people to comprehensively understand the potential physical and mental health dangers and other negative effects of drug and substance abuse.

During the session, the facilitators focused on how young people can avoid falling into the addiction trap. Some young people demonstrated a prior understanding knowledge of the dangers of drug and substance abuse and they were interested to learn new ways of avoiding the malpractice.

Finally, the young people who attended the session were also urged to reach out for support whenever they or someone they know is having mental health problems.

On 13 February 2024, YONECO conducted door-to-door Gender-Based Violence (GBV) awareness sessions around Kalonga area in Mangochi district.

The campaign mainly targeted women and adolescent girls whose limited knowledge of GBV perpetuates the vice as perpetrators are not reprimanded for their actions. In addition, the campaign also aimed at ensuring that the targeted groups of people are aware of various laws that protect them from GBV.

Several emerging issues and unreported cases of GBV were unearthed. Thus, the session facilitated the cases and made the necessary referrals for other stakeholders to provide other services.

The women and adolescent girls who were engaged during the campaign were urged to report all GBV cases using the available reporting mechanisms that were shared as well.

On 1st February the Centre for Disease Control (CDC) Country Director, Kelsey Mirkovic, visited some of YONECO's impact areas in Blantyre and Chiladzulu districts.

In her remarks, CDC Malawi country Director expressed her satisfaction with the quality of work which the CDC Malawi implementing partners are doing. Apart from YONECO, Kelsey Mirkovic also paid a visit to EGPAF, MACRO and DAPP who are in Chiradzulu and Blantyre implementing similar interventions.

Some of the key successes that have been registered across all partners include the linkage to care for all key populations who tested HIV positive, and the ability of partners to continuously reach hard-to-reach areas. In addition, the have also partners contributed to reduced stiama discrimination against people living with HIV/AIDS and that many children are being withdrawn from hot spots among others.

Stakeholders have hailed the SADC "Enhancing Access to Integrated HIV and AIDS Services Among Adolescents and **People Through** M-Health Young Southern Africa" project for enabling youth access to free information through the youth helpline toll-free line on HIV/AIDS and sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR) services.

During a courtesy call on Tuesday, Zomba District Commissioner, Reinghard Chavula said the project has helped young people to freely express themselves due to the anonymity aspect, which has saved most from dying in silence.

he project, which is being implemented in Malawi, Zimbabwe and Botswana, aims at enhancing access to integrated HIV/AIDS services among adolescents and young people through M-health in Southern Africa.

The leader of the Zimbabwe delegation from the National Aids Council-NAC, Freeman Dube said they have drawn pertinent lessons from the project that will help enhance their service provision.

On his part, one of the implementing partners, Youth Net and Counselling (YONECO) through its Executive Director MacBain Mkandawire, attributed the project's success to collaboration between partners and stakeholders.

Mkandawire expressed hope for a more holistic approach going forward with the project.

During the session, community members requested YONECO to produce and share the popular versions of the laws for reference.

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
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
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The Impact of BEFIT Programme in Chitipa District

Chitipa is one of the districts in Malawi where Building Education Foundations through Innovation and Technology (BEFIT) Programme is being implemented to improve the foundational literacy and numeracy skills of primary school learners.

Through the BEFIT Programme, a lot of children in Chitipa have been motivated to go back to school after staying at home for several academic years. Significantly, the programme has contributed to a substantial reduction in dropout rates in the targeted schools.

Thomas Mulungu is 12-year-old Standard 4 learner at Meru Primary School in the district. Thomas hails from Vongonyo Village, in the area **Traditional** (T/A)**Authority** Mwaulambia. Thomas comes from a financially disadvantaged family and more often than not, he goes to school on an empty stomach. Thomas is just one of the many learners in the area whose parents do not have reliable means of earning income to fully provide the necessary support to their children.

Before the introduction of tablet learning under the BEFIT Programme, Thomas was a perpetual absentee due to poverty. Consequently, this reflected badly on his academic performance.

The introduction of tablet lessons at Meru Primary School has invigorated Thomas, who has not missed a single class in this academic term.

One of the teachers alluded to the fact that Thomas' performance has greatly improved, and he is enjoying his studies despite the other socioeconomic challenges that are there.

According to Unicef, approximately 42 per cent of girls in Malawi are married before the age of 18, and 9 per cent of them sign their matrimonial vows before their 15th birthday.

Engaging CHWs in Preventing Climate Change-induced Health Challenges

In a bid to combat health challenges that are induced by climate change, YONECO engaged Community Healthcare Workers (CHWs) on how to address the issues.

The CHWs acknowledged that there is an increase in incidences of certain diseases due to issues of climate change. The healthcare workers first listed down several climate change-induced challenges that are common in their areas before devising possible ways of dealing with the issues.

During the two meetings, it was noted that there is a need to strengthen the capacity of community members to avoid the various health hazards that result from the impact of climate change.

"Embracing preventive measures of climate change-induced health problems is more certain and effective than responding to the consequence," explained one of the participants Hadija Abani.

The sessions that were attended by community health nurses, clinicians and Community-Based Distribution Agents (CBDA) were conducted in the areas of Traditional Authority (TA) Mposa and Mwambo in Machinga and Zomba districts respectively.

In total, 40 CHWs attended the two meeting sessions that were held under 'Making Communities Resilient to Climate Change-Induced Challenges Project which YONECO is implementing with financial support of Foundation S -The Sanofi Collective.











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
