

# **Executive Director's Note...**

### with MacBain Mkandawire



**Dear Readers** 

We are already in March 2025 and so far a lot has already happened in Malawi, particularly with the increasing silent devaluation of the Malawi kwacha. Vendors have taken to the streets to engage members of parliament regarding the prices of Kaunjika business. This movement ultimately led to the Minister of Trade's dismissal, as we saw the next day that he was fired. One fundamental question arises: Did the Minister of Trade cause the changes in commodity prices? We have witnessed numerous cases related to foreign exchange scarcity and fuel, as well as court battles where the government controls prices while companies struggle to survive.

We have seen Police and other government officials invading Lilongwe in search of foreign exchange, as intelligence indicates that some business persons are holding forex in their homes. We observe all these issues but we seem to have no clear understanding of the problem. We believe it's important for those involved in monetary policies to seriously advise the government on what the issue is. We likely need serious think tanks at the Reserve Bank and the Ministry of Finance to revisit our monetary policies. Quick-fix solutions will not help this country.

As we approach the 2025 General Elections, we are increasingly concerned about the disturbing scenes unfolding in our country, particularly those involving our men in uniform. The incident in Machinga must be unequivocally condemned. We cannot condone violence in any form. The video footage from Machinga reveals that children and young people heavily participated in these actions, which exposes them to a life of violence and conflict. The images they witness will have lasting effects in their minds, and we do not want this cycle of violence to continue. We must take decisive action to put a stop to it.

Stakeholders, Gender activists, Civil Society Organization (CSO) leaders, and Government representatives are meeting in New York for the 69th Session of the Commission on the Status of Women. This year's event is particularly significant as it coincides with the 30 years anniversary of the Beijing Conference and Plan of Action. The meeting will review progress towards the plan of action. As a country, we need to assess our progress with the plan.

### YONECO Conducts Life Skills Session at Mponda Primary School in Zomba

The Tithandizane National Helpline officers organized a life skills session at Mponda Primary School in Zomba district, focusing on self-awareness, confidence-building, and decision-making.

During the session, students learnt about self-awareness, which involves understanding one's thoughts, emotions, motivation, strengths and

weaknesses. They also explored how these factors influence behavior and interactions with others. Through interactive discussions and activities, the learners discovered practical ways to improve self-awareness, boost confidence, and make better decisions in their daily lives.

A total of 344 learners (222 boys and 122 girls). participated.

### YONECO Reaches Mulunguzi Primary School Leaners with Life Skills Session

On 29th January 2025, YONECO conducted a life skills session at Mulunguzi Primary School in the area of Traditional Authority (T/A) Mwambo in Zomba district.

The session aimed to promote positive behaviors and relationships among learners. The facilitators focused on how young people can avoid negative peer pressure, respecting other people's rights, the dangers of drug and substance

abuse and how to establish strong and positive relationships.

The Deputy Head Teacher of the school requested YONECO continue to conduct regular sessions to reinforce positive behaviors and life skills, as well as to provide ongoing support for learners in reaching their goals.

A total of 654 learners (301 males and 353 females) participated.



YONECO in collaboration with Community Focus Organization (COFO) collaborated to conduct a session on Meaningful Youth Participation (MYP) with members of Chikwawa Police Youth Club.

The session was organized to empower the young participants to actively engage in discussions and decision-making processes that impact them.

During the session, participants were equipped with essential leadership skills, including effective communication, decision-making, conflict resolution, and team building.

The training empowered the participants to take a proactive role in community activities, ensuring their perspectives are included in all development initiatives.

The youth expressed their gratitude for the timely engagement, stating they learned valuable information previously unknown to them, which would enhance their capabilities and potential.

# Empowering Futures in Phalombe Through Role Modelling and Career Guidance

14th On and 16th, YONECO February with CAVWOC (Centre partnered Alternatives for Victimized Women and Children) to conduct role modelling and career guidance sessions for children receiving bursaries from CAVWOC. The goal of these sessions was to inspire students and provide them with the knowledge and motivation to navigate their educational paths and future careers.

The initiative targeted three schools: Mpatsa CDSS, Holy Family CDSS, and Michesi Secondary School, reaching a total of 123 students, including 81 females and 42 males.

During the sessions, students were encouraged to work hard in their studies and set clear, achievable goals. Role models, including a nurse, a police

officer, and representatives from YONECO and Cavwoc, shared their personal stories and career journeys. They emphasized the importance of perseverance, hard work, and education as keys to unlocking opportunities. Hearing these firsthand accounts inspired students to envision their own potential.

The sessions also featured interactive discussions, allowing students to ask questions and engage directly with the role models.

In addition to career guidance, YONECO took the opportunity to promote its Tithandizane toll-free lines during the sessions.

### YONECO Conducts Drug and Substance Abuse Awareness Session at Islamic High School

The Tithandizane National Helpline Services officers organized a drug and substance abuse awareness session at Islamic High School in Zomba District. The session aimed to educate students about the types, effects, and risks of drug abuse, as well as coping mechanisms. It also sought to raise awareness about the consequences of drug abuse on health, academics, and future prospects, while equipping students with skills to resist peer pressure and make informed decisions.

A total of 328 students (142 male, 186 female) participated in the session. Using interactive methods such as presentations and group discussions, the officers engaged the students and encouraged them to ask questions and share their experiences related to drugs.

The session was well-received, with students expressing gratitude for the

knowledge gained and feeling more confident about making healthy choices. They particularly appreciated the interactive and engaging approach used during the session.

YONECO officers believe the session will have a positive impact on students and plan to conduct follow-up sessions in collaboration with teachers and students to promote healthy decision-making.

In conclusion, a teacher who attended the session commended YONECO for the timely intervention, noting that many students engage in such malpractices, which negatively affects their behavior and academic performance. The teacher emphasized the importance of such initiatives in supporting students and creating a healthier school environment.



### YONECO Educates Mayembe Primary School Learners on Drug Abuse

A total of 93 standard 5 to 7 learners participated in an interactive drug and substance abuse awareness session which YONECO organized at Mayembe Primary School in Rumphi district.

The session aimed to empower young people with information to make informed decisions about their health and wellbeing in relation to drug and substance abuse.

Among others, the learners identified various issues that lead them to fall into the trap of drug and substance abuse. They mentioned negative peer pressure, the influence of celebrity lifestyles portrayed on television and social media, and the need to cope with various socioeconomic challenges they face.

YONECO Field Officers conducted a group counselling session focusing on the key push factors for young people towards drug use. The learners who participated in the session were encouraged to concentrate on their studies, resist negative peer pressure, and seek help when facing challenges.

In a similar vein, YONECO also conducted a similar activity at Namilango Primary School in the area of Traditional Authority (T/A) Mchinjiri in Blantyre.

In the two sessions, facilitators shared YONECO's toll-free Youth Helpline (393) and the Drug and Substance Abuse Helpline (6600). The students were also made aware of various institutions and spaces where they can get help on mental health as well as drug and substance abuse.

# Raising Awareness on Child Exploitation and Illegal Mining in Zomba

YONECO, through YFM's *Lekeleni Mwanayu* radio program, held an awareness session with the Destiny Women Group in T/A Chikowi, Zomba, to educate the community about Child Sexual Exploitation in Travel and Tourism.

During the session, it was revealed that illegal mining activities in the area have increased, putting children and young girls at risk of abuse.

To help protect children, the women promised to spread awareness and suggested forming groups for children and youth. These groups would teach them about their rights and keep them engaged in positive activities, reducing their involvement in harmful behaviors.

So far, local authorities have not commented on the illegal mining issue.

# **Shaping Future Generations**

YONECO conducted awareness sessions on life skills for development at Isharikira and Kasyololo primary schools in Chitipa district. These sessions were aimed at helping children develop the tools and abilities they need to face life's challenges confidently and resiliently.

During the sessions, students learned important skills that will help them succeed in the future, even when facing difficult situations. The focus was on practical life skills, and the sessions included interactive activities that created a supportive environment for learning. This approach aims to empower children to become capable and confident individuals.

A total of 301 learners participated in the sessions, with 69 boys and 242 girls attending.

Through these sessions, YONECO believes that these learners will be equipped with essential life skills that will help them navigate life's challenges more effectively.

YONECO's Tithandizane Helpline Services provides crucial Department support to individuals crisis, ensuring that the assistance offered individuals and to communities is effective and responsive.

During the training exercise, counselors participated in activities that were designed to deepen their understanding of Accountability to Affected Populations (AAP), which is a critical component of humanitarian response.

YONECO conducted a comprehensive capacity strengthening exercise for the Tithandizane Helpline Services staff in humanitarian response with a particular focus on the component of Accountability to Affected Population (AAP).

The session was conducted under the Malawi Drought Response Project which is being implemented with financial support the Commission's from European Humanitarian Aid and Civil Protection department (ECHO). This project is being implemented by a consortium of eight partners: Care Malawi, Act Alliance, CADECOM, Eggle's Relief and Development Programme International, FOCCAD, Save the Children, Self Help Africa, and YONECO.



# Tithandizane Helpline Raises GBV Awareness in Njonjo Village

On February 18, 2025, YONECO's Tithandizane National Helpline Services held a meeting in Njonjo Village, Zomba District, to teach people about gender-based violence (GBV). The meeting, which was attended by 11 women, was in the area led by Traditional Authority Malemia.

The goal of the meeting was to make people more aware of GBV and to help women gain the strength to promote equality between men and women. During the meeting, those attending talked about what GBV is, what causes it, and how it hurts people, families, and communities. They spoke about how it affects health, mental well-being, and development.

The discussion focused on different kinds of GBV, like physical, emotional, and financial abuse. When talking about sexual violence, the women asked if it is abuse when a husband forces his wife to have sex, even if she is sick. They were told that it is indeed a form of abuse and were encouraged to report such

incidents to marriage counselors, the police, or YONECO for help.

Other problems that came up during the meeting included the issue of children misbehaving, which can lead to GBV. The women said that husbands often don't support the family and blame the mother for the children's behavior. The participants were told they could seek advice from YONECO and the Social Welfare office on how to raise their children better.

The women who attended the meeting said they found it very helpful and that it opened their eyes to the issue. They asked YONECO to continue holding these GBV awareness sessions regularly.

YONECO officers also shared the national toll-free numbers people can call to report different types of abuse and get counseling and guidance: 5600 (GBV), 116, 6600, and 393.

### YONECO Applauds Khama Lipindula SLV for Outstanding Achievements



YONECO in collaboration with the Chikwawa District Community Development Office (DCDO), conducted a monitoring visit to the Khama Lipindula Savings and Loans Group (SLG) on 6 February, 2025.

Established in January 2024 under the SP-GEAR project, the group has made remarkable strides in promoting financial inclusivity and empowerment among its members, who are also beneficiaries of the Social Cash Transfer Programme (SCTP).

The SLG, comprising 25 members—18 females and 7 males—has demonstrated exceptional resilience and determination. By the end of their 2024 sharing cycle, the group managed to accumulate MK 1,500,000 in shares and profits. This notable achievement has inspired members to invest in various individual businesses, including vegetable farming and livestock rearing.

During the monitoring visit, members enthusiastically shared their short-term and long-term plans, which include purchasing essential items like bicycles and paying school fees for their children. Notably, the group has also incorporated four young people, ensuring inclusiveness and equal opportunities for all.

The YONECO team commended the group for their outstanding achievements and encouraged them to continue aiming high. They also urged members to explore bigger business ideas to foster further economic growth and development.

The success of the Khama Lipindula SLG serves as a testament to how the UNICEF-funded program is influencing community-driven initiatives and the impact of collaborative efforts in promoting financial empowerment and sustainable development for the social cash transfer beneficiaries in the district.

# Promoting Gender Equality and Empowerment among SCTP Beneficiaries



On 20 February 2025, YONECO, in collaboration with the Chikwawa District Council, held an awareness meeting with beneficiaries of the Social Cash Transfer Programme (SCTP) in Traditional Authority (T/A) Makhuwira's area in a bid to promote gender equality and empower the targeted community members.

A total of 756 beneficiaries from Tsapa, Chikuse and Chiliza clusters attended the meeting which aimed to address discriminatory norms and promote gender-transformative approaches at community level. The beneficiaries were engaged on issues about human rights and the importance of gender-sensitive decision-making at community and household levels. Additionally, participants were introduced to a new receiving **SCTP** funds, system for cash-based transitioning from transactions to mobile money, which enhances security and accessibility.

A key highlight of the meeting was the registration of young people aged 18 to 35—either SCTP beneficiaries or children of beneficiaries—for a new skills development project facilitated by UNICEF and TEVETA. This initiative aims to equip youth with vocational skills to improve their economic prospects.

Furthermore, the session emphasized the importance of reporting abuse at both the household and community levels. Beneficiaries were encouraged to use the Tithandizane Helpline Services toll-free helplines: 116, 5600, 6600, and 393.

This awareness initiative is expected to empower beneficiaries to challenge harmful norms, make informed decisions, and seek support when needed.

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
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



The Environmental Management Act of Malawi (2017) aims to protect the environment and conserve natural resources. The Act establishes environmental standards and outlines how to manage and control pollution and other environmental issues.

One key provision encourages public participation, emphasizing that the roles and responsibilities for environmental management lie in the hands of every individual. To ensure adherence to this provision, YONECO in Ntcheu collaborated with other stakeholders in the district during a Clean-Up campaign organized by the District Council.



# 40-YEAR-OLD MAN OVERCOMES ADVERSITY WITH THE SP-GEAR PROJECT
